Goli otok is the most known uninhabited island in Croatia. During the second half of the 20th Century it had served as an internment camp for political reeducation, then as a prison. The buildings on the island are monuments of the past events which have been falling apart for decades, despite the great interest of the visitors. The ill-famed name of the island is a popular metaphor still nowadays.

To establish a culture of remembrance based on scientific research, the Friedrich Ebert Stiftung Office Croatia and *Documenta* – Center for Dealing with the Past, have published a historical guide to the Goli Otok internment camp.
